Explanation of
Tourist Attraction

Sororito Odawara is in a location not far from Odawara Castle headed toward the ocean. This shop is a workshop café where you can experience primarily the two following workshops: The popular “underglaze cobalt blue small dish making” (approx. 1 hr.) in which you treat unglazed vessels with a design using blue zaffer and the “sachet making” (approx. 30 min.) in which you make originally blended sachets using six types of natural fragrances. How about making your favorite, one-of-a-kind sachet?

selling point

There are also workshops in which you can make chopstick holders, broaches, and flower pots using clay, as well as porcelain panel paintings that you draw using colorful underglaze colors. After the workshop, you can relax by enjoying some tea.

Nearby Sightseeing Spot

Hotoku Ninomiya Shrine



A shrine located in the immediate vicinity of Odawara Castle. It deifies Ninomiya Sontoku who saved a lot of rural areas and clans from poverty in the late Edo period and pursued people's happiness with his own ideals and practicalism. Festivals are held in April and September.

Seikantei



This villa, built in Minamicho, Odawara City, was owned by Marquis Nagashige Kuroda, who was active during the Meiji era. The building was built using the unconventional Sukiya style, where one-story and two-story houses are lined up.
